Regional Representatives Changes

Unfortunately, Peter Lewis has resigned as the representative for region 2 and will concentrate on activities at his Rotorua shed. We thank him for his willingness to take up the role.

Bunnings Power Pass and community support programs

In Christchurch, the Shirley Bunnings store had a dilemma. Too many community support requests and not enough staff to do them. They approached the local Canterbury men's shed hub and subsequently attended a hub meeting where they outlined a proposal. If Bunnings supplied all of the materials, would sheds be interested in doing the projects? Two sheds are taking part in a trial which when completed will be reviewed and a decision made on future projects.

At the same meeting Bunnings were asked how they in return would support the sheds taking part. Naturally we were looking for product discounts. Bunnings referred us to their Power Pass scheme which provides discounts for commercial customers.

The Bunnings [Power Pass scheme](#) is for commercial customers but sheds can also apply. The scheme is intended for purchases made on behalf of the organisation not individuals and sheds should respect that. When applying, if you are a company, use your IRD number if not registered for GST. If not a company, apply as a sole trader and supply your IRD number. Do not expect massive discounts, it will depend on the products being purchased and if promotional pricing applies.

Bunnings receive lots of requests to support community projects and those are assessed on a case by case basis, if you have a worthy project in mind, put in a request. Shirley Bunnings have stated they will support the coming conference with a product donation.

Blackwoods Protector

Financial members of MENZSHED NZ have access to the same product discounts that are offered to construction business customers. Sheds are enrolled as member subs are received. Trademark - *MENZSHED*®

The ® symbol indicates registration of a trademark. MENZSHED New Zealand Inc. is now the registered owner of the word MENZSHED, whether in upper-case, lower-case or as a logo. The purpose behind seeking registration was to secure the “brand” for genuine shed use and avoid commercial exploitation.

We do not intend to use our ownership of the word to force sheds to become members of MENZSHED NZ or prevent use of the word in your shed name. But we would have to look at enforcement of our rights should a shed bring the movement into disrepute.

Registered charities – Keeping returns and fees up to date

If your shed is an Incorporated Society, a Charitable Trust or registered at Charities Services, there are obligations to advise changes of officers or rules and to file annual returns.

If you are claiming that you are a member of MENZSHED NZ, as part of a funding application, then you need to have paid your annual sub. Why are we raising this? At least one shed has been de-registered at Charities Services through failure to file their annual return. Two sheds, as part of their funding applications, were invited to supply a letter from our Secretary confirming current affiliation. That led to a scramble to cough up the \$25 membership fee ☺.

Storing shed documentation, correspondence and email.

Our shed database has records of 93 sheds or new shed projects but just 28 have a corporate type of email address (e.g. secretary@menzshed.nz; secretary.xyzshed@gmail.com). The remainder are clearly personal or family email accounts. We could infer that other important shed records are stored

on home computers.

How easy will it be to recover your email and records history if a computer dies, is hacked or stolen? If your chairman / treasurer / secretary is not around, how will you access those records? We recommend that sheds consider using a free corporate style email account. A very good option is Google which provides email (Gmail). You could have addresses for each officer like this; chairman.xxxshed@gmail.com , secretary.xxxshed@gmail.com , treasurer.xxxshed@gmail.com, coordinator.xxxshed@gmail.com

Each address can be shared with the others, so if one of the team is out of action, another person can access or reassign the account. Of the 28 sheds with corporate addresses, Google Gmail is by far the most popular.

Gmail also powers the MENZSHED NZ Executive email with our domain name...@menshed.nz replacing...@gmail.com. Google can also provide a shared drive (cloud storage) and popular applications Sheets and Docs (the equivalent to Excel and Word).

Other community projects have included building shelving for the new IHC shop in Richmond, building wheelchair access ramps for hospice and assisting NMIT carpentry students with building planter boxes for Broadgreen Intermediate School.



Menzshed Whakatu

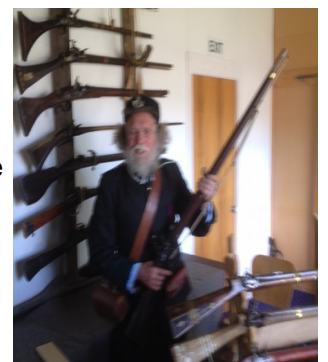

Menzshed Whakatu has plans to operate a "time bank" for members who would prefer to do work in lieu of paying a membership fee.

As always, there's been lots of activity in the Picton Men's Community Shed. The garden operation continues to be a nice steady revenue earner, with plants, herbs and natives being propagated and grown by the boys in keen demand.

The 27 Montague Whaler, it's restoration a major focus of the Shed for a number of years, is now almost finished. We hope that by early new year, we'll have completed the re-build, when she'll be handed back to her owners, the Picton Seaport Trust.

Our participation in Adult Learners' Week attracted some good publicity during September. It provided a welcome opportunity providing to promote the Mens' Shed movement. This government funded initiative aims to encourage learning for life, and in the Picton area, Adult Learners' Week was co-ordinated by REAP Marlborough. We ran a shop-front display for a week, held an open day at the Shed, secured some pre event advertising, and at the conclusion, some newspaper coverage, all important avenues through which to promote our profile.

The regular monthly visits by a Blenheim rest home continue, where residents spend an afternoon working on a chosen project, then enjoy sharing an afternoon tea.

Sadly, the gloss of the last quarter dimmed a little through the passing away of two of our members. Given our relatively small membership base, such a loss was keenly felt. Unpredicted in the initial stages, this did provide an opportunity for our chaps to expand their skills and to turn their planning to something unforeseen.

One of our two late members, in the latter stages of his ill health, expressed a wish that his Shed mates build him a coffin. What eventuated was somewhat more than that. We built his coffin, we held his funeral service in our Men's Shed, Jim Davis, president of the Blenheim Shed came and officiated, and after the event we made an ashes container. We gifted the coffin, and ashes container, to his widow, and donated the use of our Shed without cost. It was a great way to farewell a respected and very popular member, who, for the last three or four years had gained so much pleasure and benefit from his time with us.

New sheds

New sheds or new shed projects continue to pop up around the country. Recent ones include; Huntly, North Dunedin and Lumsden.

Two existing sheds have been recently added to the website; Westland Industrial Heritage Park and CHB Menzshed Waipukurau.

Shed collaboration

So if your shed is in the Waikato, West Coast, Marlborough, Nelson or Wellington area, talk to your local sheds to see if they are interested. Then let MENZSHED NZ know so we can publicise it. In Canterbury, the shed hub meetings are run every 2nd month.

4. Access to research, health and other benefits

The executive supported Jenny Moore in her research initiative and selected sheds will have received shed and personal questionnaires. A report on this is due later this year.

The AMSA conference is also expected to contribute in this area.

5. Reduce overheads as a way of keeping membership costs down
As mentioned elsewhere, the move to Google Apps for free mail and replacement of the GoToMeeting product will reduce overheads.

6. Updating our database of sheds and contact information and enabling shared access amongst the MENZSHED NZ Executive.
Completed with the move to Google not for profits.

Sheds that do not renew their membership will lose access to member only benefits. The shed website page will remain but the membership status will revert to [MENZSHED NZ Status: Complimentary hosting](#).

MENZSHED NZ exists to promote the spread of men's sheds in NZ. The website provides a searchable facility where the public can look for sheds in their locality. Most men's shed enquiries go direct to the relevant shed.
