MENZSHED NZ will work with the member sheds in the regions that have a vacancy to secure a rep.



AKAROA MENS SHED

Akaroa Men's Shed Trust (AMST) was conceived at a community Men's Health Meeting in 2012. We had 30-40 interested men and started the process to form a shed. As many sheds have gone before us, there was knowledge to be gained. So formation was the easy part. Finding a shed was the hard part! We entertained a variety of existing buildings including garages, pottery sheds and even an old piggery building. We looked at land where we could build a shed. After 3 years there was a bit of disillusionment – would we ever find a shed. When all was looking desperate, we finally found our present premises in the old Banks Peninsula District Council's engineering workshop. It was an area of ground that had been disused for some time and contaminated by diesel spills, so

was unfit for use. The now Christchurch City Council (CCC) wanted a presence on the site and we wanted a shed, so it was a win-win situation. CCC offered us a nominal rent, rewired the building, reroofed due to leaks and even put in an electric roller door, so they have been and continue to be excellent landlords and we work well together, painting the outside for them and undertaking minor repairs.

Our initial projects have mostly involved birds!. We have worked with the Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust and built morepork and rifleman nesting boxes.

We have also aided our booming little blue penguin population in Flea Bay by building nesting boxes for them.

And we must not forget our Tui population which has been reintroduced to the peninsula and is thriving in the environment. As a fund raiser for the shed we have made Tui feeders from treated 5 ply, painted a lovely forest green (see photo below). Using the upturned wine bottle and saucer configuration with a sugar solution, it attracts not only Tui's but bellbirds and sparrows. These have sold for \$50 as a charitable donation to the shed and has brought in a reasonable income.

Many of our shed members (we are now up to over 30 paid members) do their own projects but we are active in the community. We have made signage for the Akaroa garden tour and Garden of Tane, made tree protectors, renovated and constructed signs for both Anglican and Presbyterian Churches. We have also built a picnic table for Childrens Bay, with another requested.

Our latest projects are creating kanuka walking sticks for sale at Akaroa Saturday market and renovating an old bench seat and cabinet from the old Akaroa Hospital for placement in the entranceway to the new Health Hub.

Finally, we took up the challenge thrown out to Mens Sheds from the Child Cancer Foundation and raised \$370 during a one day street collection.

It was a pleasure to welcome other Canterbury Sheds to the regional Hub Meeting in February. It was a great day and valuable to network with other sheds. One of newest members penned his thoughts: "Well, the last day of Feb 2019 was the best day ever for the Akaroa Men's Shed Trust! On the 28th March we hosted the Canterbury Regional Hub Day".

All up, including our members, some 32+ happy club members from as far away as Timaru, Ashburton, Rolleston, Amberley and other greater Christchurch urban clubs, sat down for a BBQ lunch and a good old natter. Yes, men do talk a lot too!

Memories, workshop tool techniques, experiences and each club's projects were discussed and various tips and tricks were passed on for all.

The weather was fine and we all sat outside the club "shed" at the Christchurch City Council, Duvauchelle depot, to enjoy a great lunch.

Thanks to all those that took the effort to help, travel and attend. I'm sure I can say it was enjoyed by all."

Carved Celtic cross travels from the Taieri Blokes Shed to grace the walls of the oldest church in England.

It all started by a fellow member of the TBS who used to live near one of the oldest Church in England, "Bradwell-on-Sea" This church was built in year 854 from ruins of a Roman Fort.

Bill's family lived near the church, also, their daughter was married in this church, before the family moved to Mosgiel. Six years ago he joined the Taieri Shed. After watching another fellow member carving our shed sign that hangs on our shed wall,




Bill asked if he would carve a celtic cross out of kauri. George accept the challenge and after a month's work carving the cross was finished.

Shortly after, Mr Clayton of Bradwell, who was touring NZ, called in to see the Chapples, agreed to return home with the Celtic Cross and hand it over to the retired Chaplain where it now hangs with pride.

Photos include handing the cross to Mr Clayton from George, also the Chaplain receiving it. The square carving with TBS now graces our shed wall.

The Taieri Blokes Shed members have the honour of their shed name hanging on the wall of one of the oldest churches in England. A great achievement.

What a difference a roof makes.

After working in a cold damp shed, the North East Valley shed is now a great, bright, workspace. All old roofs leak, and drip with condensation limiting where you could place machinery also letting little light in.

After applying, the shed received a very generous grant from the NZ Lottery Grants Board, they have completely reroofed their shed which includes six full lengths of light strips. No more condensation drips. Now the whole environment has changed from a fridge to glasshouse. It shows up on the members' faces and I am sure will help to attract more members to the shed. The shed acknowledge the assistance of two roofers who volunteered putting the roof on.

Roger's email "it is a book that I have written and self published to help educate the average person about their health and how they might be able to improve their current situation.


As you will see, it compares how you might look after yourself like you look after your car. This should certainly resonate with your members".

Off to the Menzshed





To say thank you we took up morning tea for everyone at the shed. The children made chocolate brownie, pizza and a cake, which went down a real treat.


